Examples of Research Experience

“Nothing More, Nothing Less: Eliza Clerc, Deafness, and Motherhood in Victorian North America”

- First of a kind senior thesis
- Focuses on the intersection of gender, race, class, and disability during the nineteenth-century in North America
- Provides a unique and distinct picture of the shift in perceptions of both disability and gender roles during the nineteenth-century

“From Submission to Revolution: Marriage, Revolution, and Gender Roles in Eighteenth-Century Río de la Plata”

- Focuses on the changing social and political climate of eighteenth-century Río de la Plata
- Discusses how the revolutionary climate of the region influenced a shift in gender roles; women actively joined the revolution to fight for the rights of their new homeland
- Very little research is done on gender roles during this time and in this region, most scholarly work focusing on the economic and politic aspects of the revolution.

“The Diminishing of Perpetua: An Analysis of Early Christianity and Gender Roles”

- An analysis of gender roles within early Christianity, focusing on the martyrdom of Vibia Perpetua
- Examines how women have been lost and actively erased within Christianity
- Discusses how early Christianity encouraged social divergence and what the lasting implications of this defiance mean for both men and women

“Intersectionality Lecture April 26th, 2018”

- Created at the request of Dr. Ranier Buschmann at CSUCI
- Extensive research done in order to educate a class of undergraduate history students in how to incorporate intersectionality into their historical research and writing
